We are having a youth mission trip this year! The Sunset Hills Youth Group is leaving on Sunday, July 4 for a week in Benton Harbor, Michigan. Benton Harbor is a predominately Black town located directly across an inlet from an affluent vacation town, highlighting the economic and racial disparities facing our nation. The work that our youth will be doing in Benton Harbor will be

challenging, and they will learn a lot about how to show love in a complicated world.

If you're anything like me, you probably wish you could join them. You probably wish you could be in Asheville this summer to do mission work with our adults, or Crestfield for Mission Possible with our younger teens. There remain mission opportunities that have been cancelled because of this pandemic, and we wish we could hop in that 12-passenger van with our teenagers!

The good news is this: we have the opportunity to LOVE in a complicated world right here in Sunset Hills. Our mission commission has been busy crafting opportunities for us to show love locally, across our nation, and around the world. They are busy putting together opportunities to collect supplies for our mission co-workers at the U.S./Mexico border, as well as opportunities to support their mission through the purchase of their coffee. Likewise, the commission and session are partnering with local Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) churches to provide for the safety of immigrants in our immediate area.

In the meantime, as these mission opportunities come together, there's multiple simple ways we can show love. The first and foremost way is to build relationships with our neighbors. Get to know the people in

Music Notes By Shelby Gracey

"If my people, who are called by my name, will humble themselves and pray and seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then will I hear from heaven and will forgive their sin and will heal their land."

As we enter July when we celebrate our country's Independence Day, it seems appropriate to highlight what's known as our country's "National Hymn."

"We need to be reminded that a nation can receive God's blessing only when He is recognized as ruler and Lord. Christian people in every land have an awesome responsibility – to be models of God's righteousness – "salt" and "light" for a sinful and hurting society. The moral strength of a nation rests upon the knees of God's people.

"God of our Fathers" (or "God of the Ages" as it's become known in recent years) also reminds us that concerned citizens of the heavenly kingdom should also be involved citizens of their earthly kingdom. The hymn text was written in 1876, the year that America was preparing to celebrate its one-hundredth anniversary of the signing of the Declaration of Independence. Daniel Crane Roberts,

GOD OF OUR FATHERS

a thirty-five-year-old rector of a small Episcopal church in Brandon, Vermont, felt that the country should have a new national hymn for the occasion. His new song was sung for the first time by the parishioners of the Brandon village church for their worship service on July 4, 1876.

"Later, at the time of the actual National Centennial Observance commemorating the adoption of the Constitution, Roberts' hymn text was chosen as the official hymn for that event. These words remind us well that the God who has so richly blessed our land in the past is the One still needed to be "our ruler, guardian, guide, and stay."

"God of our fathers, whose almighty hand leads forth in beauty all the starry band of shining worlds in splendor thru the skies, our grateful songs before Thy throne arise.

They love divine hath led us in the past, in this free land by Thee our lot is cast; be Thou our ruler, guardian, guide, and stay. Thy word our law, Thy paths our chosen way.

From war's alarms, from deadly pestilence, by Thy strong arm our ever sure defense; Thy true religion in our hearts increase; Thy bounteous goodness nourish us in peace.

Refresh Thy people on their toilsome way. Lead us from night to never ending day; fill all our lives with love and grace divine, and glory, laud, and praise be ever Thine."

Mission Updates



OCK IT TO ME WITH COFFEE

As you probably

know, the situation at the Mexican/ American border has been nothing short of erratic and chaotic. During the pandemic, Frontero de Cristo, our Binational Border Ministry, mostly served families awaiting to petition for asylum for men and women being removed from the United States and sent to Agua Prieta, on the Arizona border, in the middle of the night; children suffering domestic violence or confronting the reality of the drug culture. Each of these becoming more complex as the year proceeded.

Now the Ministry's mission is changing. In December they started seeing large numbers being repatriated to Mexico and the Center once again became a place of welcome and refuge for thousands of people being returned.

The numbers continue to grow with thousands of individuals seeking asylum, but they are now being allowed to stay in the United States while they wait.

Our ministry works on both sides of the border which is Agua Prieta, Mexico, and Dougla Prieta, USA.

In an email to Mark Adams on the border we asked, "How can we help?" "What do you need the most?" Mark's reply: *Pray for* us; buy our coffee, Café Justo; send us socks!

So, we will! They are sending us bags of Café Justo, regular and caffeine free, and we will sell it to you for \$12. It is very good coffee. No profit for us. They have a consortium of independent farmers who send the beans to the border ministry who roast them to send out. Each bag has the grower's name on it.

Just as important is the "Sock Drive" we will have in July. With the thousands of migrants the ministry sees, their major goal is to treat them humanely. That includes their feet. We can't even imagine the condition of their feet after they have walked hundreds of miles. They can't give them all shoes, but they can facilitate healthy feet with socks.

In July, please look for the donation "Box for Sox" in Findley Hall and be prepared to buy some excellent fresh coffee as your reward.





Nobel Peace Prize Laureates His Holiness the Dalai Lama and Archbishop Desmond Tutu have survived more than fifty years of



exile and the soul-crushing violence of oppression.

Despite their hardships—or, as they would say, because of them—they are two of the most joyful people on the planet. In April 2015, Archbishop Tutu traveled to the Dalai Lama's home in Dharamsala, India, to celebrate His Holiness's eightieth birthday and to create what they hoped would be a gift for others. They looked back on their long lives to answer a single burning question: How do we find joy in the face of life's inevitable suffering? They traded intimate stories, teased each other continually, and shared their spiritual practices. By the end of a week filled with laughter and punctuated with tears, these two global heroes had stared into the abyss and despair of our time and revealed how to live a life brimming with joy.

This book offers us a rare opportunity to experience their astonishing and unprecendented week together, from the first embrace to the final good-bye.

We get to listen as they explore the Nature of True Joy and confront each of the Obstacles of Joy—from fear, stress, and anger to grief, illness, and death. They then offer us the Eight Pillars of Joy, which provide the foundation for lasting happiness. Throughout, they include stories, wisdom, and science. Finally, they share their daily Joy Practices that anchor their own emotional and spiritual lives.

The Archbishop has never claimed sainthood, and the Dalai Lama considers himself a simple monk. In this unique collaboration, they offer us the reflection of real lives filled with pain and turmoil in the midst of which they have been able to discover a level of peace, of courage, and of joy to which we can all aspire in our own lives.
